
## Art & Culture Interest Group

In 2001 she suffered a near-fatal accident that placed her in a coma. Mrs. El Khalil spent two years undergoing dozens of surgeries that enabled her to walk again. Determined to celebrate the gift of life and mobility, she founded the marathon to help mend divisions in Lebanon. She wanted to shift the focus from that which divides the Lebanese people, and bring them together to celebrate that which they have in common—their love for exercise and their relationships with friends and family. Mrs. El Khalil spoke at the TED global conference in Edinburgh Scotland in 2013. There she shared the Beirut Marathon Association's story with an international audience, and she explained that she founded the largest

running event in the Middle East as an instrument of peace through sports. The assertion she made in her talk was that "peacemaking was not a sprint, but a marathon", meaning that this kind of endeavor was a long race that requires commitment, endurance, and optimal belief in the ultimate goal. For May this optimum goal is peace and prosperity for her country, as she still runs her figurative Marathon towards that goal.

Mrs. El Khalil has been recognized for her work nationally and internationally the AIPS Power of Sport Award in Lausanne, and the Laureus World Sports Academy Lifetime achievement award in Abu Dhabi.





# Chinese New Year Koii Restaurant



On Sunday, February7, the year of the Monkey swept away the last of the Goats, and 27 members of the Club sat down to celebrate the Chinese New Year at the Koii restaurant in Great Barrington.

After a delightful spring-like drive through the Berkshires, bathed in sunshine, we were warmly welcomed as we gathered around individual tables and chatted with fellow club members. The expected buffet-style presentation never materialized; instead we enjoyed a more traditional family-style service. one table at a time, of course after course of tempting food, offered with grace and charm by a cadre of helpful servers.
